

2021 ANNUAL REPORT

Dear Friends:

To say 2021 was another challenging year would be an understatement. The COVID pandemic continued to bring illness, loss and economic hardship to so many families and the demand for support remained high. Just like last year, the Co-Op faced many challenges. However, the Lord continued to put blessings in front of each challenge.

For example:

- We have not been able to kick off our Some Buddy volunteer program (our senior citizen volunteer program) because of ongoing pandemic concerns. Despite that, the number of senior home deliveries are at an all-time high and the good news - we have plenty of volunteers helping with those home deliveries.
- In 2020, most of our regular volunteers were senior citizens. When COVID hit, we lost 98% of our volunteer base. The blessing in the pandemic was that we had access to volunteers we would not normally have access to. We had student volunteers, we had people who were working from home who could spare a couple of hours to help, and we had brand new volunteers fill in the gaps. As of today, we have a great new volunteer base. We miss our senior volunteers and hope to have them back soon.
- Our thrift store renovations were supposed to have been completed in 2020. All renovation plans were

put on hold as it was literally "all hands on deck" in the pantry. In 2021, the Lord sent us a wonderful volunteer that offered his professional services at no charge to help with the store renovations. The store renovations were completed, under budget, in May of 2021. I am proud to announce that the Co-Op completed all renovations, paid off the loan for the original building and is now **DEBT FREE!!!**

We are proud of how we - through collaborations with amazing partners, the generosity of donors and our staff and volunteers' dedication - developed new and better ways to support our neighbors in need. We will highlight some of those ways in this report. Because of our partners and supporters like you, the North Gwinnett Co-Op is stronger and more prepared than ever for the months and years ahead as so many of our neighbors move from crisis to recovery. We thank you, and we hope you enjoy reading about all you have helped us to accomplish.

Food insecurity means that people are unable to provide enough food for themselves and their families. Families living with food insecurity often have to choose between paying bills or buying food.

Food insecurity can impact many aspects of someone's life. Hunger and related stress make it difficult to perform well in school or at a job. Food insecurity is linked with numerous health conditions including diabetes, hypertension, and depression. The cost of managing these conditions places additional stress on families. Living with food insecurity impacts many aspects of everyday life which makes it a complex problem to solve.

HEART HEALTHY FOOD PROGRAM

ANOTHER PANDEMIC BLESSING

Food pantries are not generally known for having nutritious food and we wanted to change that. In February 2020, we began our HEART HEALTHY FOOD PROGRAM. The goal of the program is to bring nutritious foods to our neighbors on a daily basis. Then the pandemic started. At the beginning of the pandemic, we could no longer purchase food from our suppliers, as everyone was having a hard time with inventory. At that time, restaurants were also closed and suppliers were looking for new partnerships. In 2020, we were able to collaborate with some restaurant suppliers to purchase fruits, vegetables, meats and dry goods. In 2021, we transferred that partnership to local suppliers for fresh fruits, vegetables and milk. We now receive weekly deliveries for our neighbors. Because of your generous support, we are able to budget just over \$1,000 a week for this initiative. JOBILE FOOD PANTRY

In attempt to reach those who are unable to reach us, our Mobile Food Pantry Program launched in October of 2021. The pantry goes out 6-8 times a month to different communities to bring fresh fruits, vegetables, milk and pantry basics to our neighbors in need. In 2021, the Mobile Food Pantry Program served over 300 individuals. Service dates are listed on our website and through social media. We are seeking volunteers, especially bilingual English/Spanish speaking volunteers, to assist with pantry distributions.
